

Gravestones and Memorials

We welcome families wanting to bury their loved ones, and we encourage people to place a stone to mark the spot. Please contact us if you want to discuss a Funeral or a Burial of Ashes. There are rules about the size and colour of stones, which help to ensure that churchyards remain both sacred and beautiful. The stonemason should be aware of these Churchyard Regulations and help you with the required paperwork, and we will liaise with you and them to help you choose the right memorial.



Maintenance

To ensure that our churchyards remain safe places of quiet reflection, we carefully maintain the area, cutting grass and managing the many trees. This is only possible through kind donations from families. We are grateful for both regular and occasional donations.

In order to help us to manage and maintain our churchyards, we ask the following:

- * Please only place one pot of flowers or potted plant at an interment plot to ensure adequate space for others.
- * While fresh flowers and bulbs are encouraged, please do not use artificial flowers and other ornamental items around the plot as these can be harmful to wildlife.



* Flowering annuals are most welcome and bring natural beauty to the churchyard, but we ask that you do not plant perennials, shrubs, bushes or conifers as these can damage gravestones and their plots.

We ask this to ensure that our churchyards remain a living sanctuary to our loved ones who have sadly passed away, and to preserve the diversity of wildlife that God has blessed us with.
